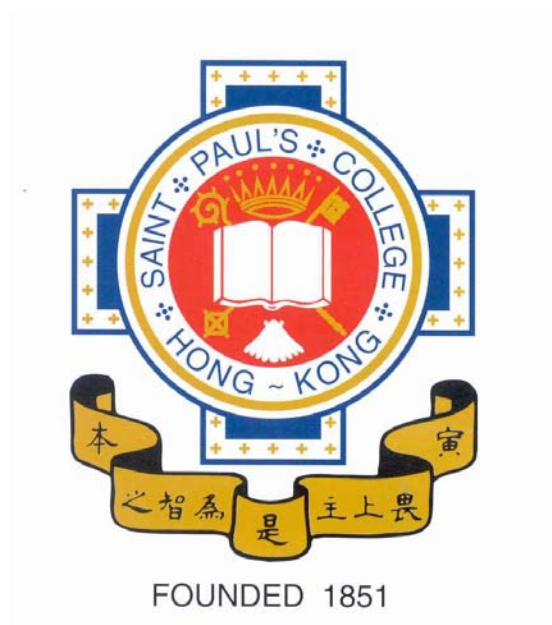

### Mission

The school is managed by the St. Paul's College Council which is a body incorporated by special ordinance. The mission of the School as stated in the ordinance is: the offering to Hong Kong students of a modern, liberal education founded upon Christian principles, Protestant and Evangelical, as professed by the Sheng Kung Hui.

### College Council

The College Council is established under the St. Paul's College Council Incorporation Ordinance. There are eighteen members in 2007-2008.

### Class Structure

St. Paul's College Primary School is a whole-day primary boys' school affiliated to St. Paul's College, both under the Direct Subsidy Scheme. There are 6 levels from Junior Class 1 to Junior Class 6, with 3 classes at each level.

The number of pupils on roll in September 2007 stood at 542, with three classes per level from primary one to primary six.

## **Headmistress' Report**

### **Staff**

We had a total of thirty-two teachers in 2007 – 2008, including the Headmistress, the Deputy Head, six Senior Teachers, twenty-four teachers (including two native-speaking English teachers), a librarian, and a student guidance counsellor. Our team of support staff included two I.T. technicians, two teacher assistants, four clerical staff members and five janitors.

Mr. Chan Kam Chung Stanley and Miss de Mel Aneesha resigned at the end of the 2006 – 2007 school year and November 2007 respectively. In the new term, we were happy to greet Mr. Chow Chi Kin Albert who joined our teaching team in September, and Mrs. Beth Roberta Conrad in January 2008.

### **Visitors**

In November, Mrs. Ellen Johnson, wife of the Rt. Revd. Colin R. Johnson, Bishop of the Diocese of Toronto, and Mrs. Kathy Yu, wife of Rt. Revd. Patrick Yu, Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Toronto, paid a friendly visit to our school. They were interested in the curriculum offered to the children in primary schools and kindergartens in Hong Kong.

In January, Mr. Andrew Hancock from the University of Edinburgh visited our school to observe Chinese lessons. He was on a research tour to Hong Kong and his interest was biliteracy development among Chinese children. He believed that educators in Hong Kong did a great job in enabling school children to acquire effective language skills in bilingualism years ago, and now trilingualism, and therefore came to Hong Kong to see it for himself. In June, while Mr. Hancock returned to Hong Kong to present his paper at a conference, he revisited us with Ms Andrea Young and Ms Christine Helot, two scholars from France. They had a good exchange with the language teachers and the boys in our school.

In February, our school was selected to be the host school for a two-day joint schools teacher development activity organised by the Council of Central & Western District Schools. We received more than 70 guests, including principals and teachers from the Central, Western and Southern Districts, and two award-winning, outstanding teachers from Beijing, who gave two demonstration lessons in the teaching of Chinese and mathematics respectively, both in Putonghua. One of our J.C. 4 classes was arranged to attend the lessons. The high standard of Putonghua of our boys stunned even the teachers from Beijing!

### **Curriculum Development**

Self-evaluation and curriculum improvement continued to be a crucial part of our school development programme. Miss Mai Man Ling, Curriculum Development Mistress, visited classes on a regular basis to give feedback to teachers in how to make teaching more interesting and effective. We aim to provide quality teaching and an ever-improving curriculum for the children who join our school and learn with us.

This year, our enrichment programme in mathematics and English covered JC2 – JC6 and JC1 – JC6 respectively. Led by Mr. Lau Wai Man, Deputy Head and Mathematics Panel Chair, and Mrs. Tong Tsui Wing Ki Anne, English Panel Chair, our Mathematics and English teachers devoted time and effort to providing the boys with the opportunity to excel or to learn more effectively. Boys were streamed and had lessons in relatively smaller groups once every week in order that the learnt material could be enhanced and consolidated.

In October 2007, the Standing Committee on Language Education and Research (SCOLAR) announced the launch of a support scheme to encourage the full and systematic implementation of using Putonghua to teach Chinese in schools. Prior to the announcement, we implemented a school-based Putonghua enhancement programme in 2003 and started teaching Chinese in Putonghua in JC4 in 2006. Putonghua continued to be the medium of instruction in the teaching of Chinese in JC4 and JC5 in our school in 2007–2008. The performance of the students made us feel even more confident in proceeding with our plan.

Project-learning has always been a core element in the learning of general studies. As part of our ongoing efforts to improve the learning experience for our students, this year we integrated learning elements from different subjects into the projects that the boys carried out. This enabled project-learning to be achieved more effectively, and students were able to derive a wider range of skills from more focussed projects. To develop a sense of belonging and responsibility towards our motherland, students from JC4 were invited to cheer for the Beijing 2008 Olympic Torch Relay Team at Sha Tin Racecourse in May. The Budding Scientists Club has been very successful this year. Led by Mr. Lee Mun Lam, our General Studies Panel Chair, students from JC4 – 6 have made working models of robots, cars, planes and boats, taken part in competitions and visited places of interest in Hong Kong. Members have been enhanced by this scheme and three of them

attained First Honour in the Hong Kong Budding Scientists Award Scheme (2007-2008) which was organised by the Education Bureau for gifted students.

The religious education lessons have been revised and were further enriched with stories from real life, in which Christian ethics were made easy to understand. In December 2007, our senior school choir joined the Hong Kong Franklin Graham Festival Choir performance to help in serving God and the others. To cultivate a sense of love and care among the boys, the Christian teachers organised the whole-school praying for the cyclone victims in Burma and the earthquake victims in Sichuan. Some boys were trained to be assembly leaders to lead the pray and sing hymns to praise the Lord.

For the fifth year, we participated in the Joint Schools Visual Art Display. Students' works of three schools were gathered and displayed in the participating schools in turns. Over 350 pieces of work were on display in our school from 29th May, 2008 to 4th June, 2008. We learnt to appreciate one another's creativity and effort, and had a chance to share with others what we produced over the year.

In addition to the mainstream curriculum, our outreach programme, led by Mr. Fok Ka Wing, is an integral part of school life. It comprises educational visits, talks and extra-curricular activities. The boys feel proud of being members of the Senior or Junior School Choir, Instrumental Groups, Sports Teams, Choral Speaking Teams, Mathematics Challenge Group, Science Workshop, Go Team, Service Groups (CYC, JPC, Cub-scouts, Road Safety Patrol), Chinese Calligraphy Group, Fencing Team or Campus TV Crew.

A popular addition to the range of recreation available to the boys during recess has been the institution by Miss A de Mel and Mrs. B. Conrad of an "English Club" which runs every lunch time recess. The club is run by the boys themselves and provides a relaxed atmosphere for all students to play board games in an English speaking environment. In addition, led by Mr. Neil David Watson and Mr. Lee Mun Lam, our senior boys also enjoy the fun time in the Drama Club relaunched this year.

To develop the boys' multiple intelligences, since September 2004, we have included a co-curricular programme in our timetable. This programme enables the boys to learn different life skills through games and a "book-free curriculum". Soon after the final examinations, the boys conducted demonstration sessions to display learning outcomes, sharing with schoolmates of different classes what they had learnt in the programme.

## **Guidance and Counselling**

The Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups provided guidance and counselling service for our boys for the second year. Mr. Wong Ying Kit, Student Guidance Counsellor, conducted talks and workshops in the Growth lessons and organised a series of seminars for teachers and parents. Each seminar focused on a different problem encountered by teachers and parents. The seminars were well received, and after the seminars, follow-up service was rendered to individual parents according to their needs.

The fifth phase of our whole school approach “Embrace the World” was launched. Under the leadership of Mrs. Ho Tai Sau Man, our Discipline and Guidance Mistress, a series of activities was implemented to rouse the boys’ interest in cultures of different countries. Taking part in activities as diverse as “Dress Special Day”, flag days and flower sales, collecting “Lai See” for the needy has allowed them to understand community needs and how they can help. Taking a world view has been something we have been keen to engender in our students. The programme this year, “Embrace the World”, has helped the boys see clearly the importance of caring for the planet, to appreciate and respect different cultures. The boys researched different topics in relation to national cultures and customs and shared their thoughts and findings.

In June, forty-eight boys (Paul’s Ambassadors), three parent volunteers and four staff members went on a learning trip – Paul’s Action – in Qing Yuan, China. Six social workers from YWCA helped organise the trip. We visited a school and stayed for two nights in the village homes. We made friends with the children there, had lessons and played games with them. We donated stationery to the school and initiated a programme of sponsorship for twenty-five students in that school. It is our hope that the Paul’s Ambassadors may learn to lead a fuller life by sharing with and serving others.

As in previous years, our boys were encouraged to serve the community, to show love and care to the needy people around us. In this, we are grateful that we always have unfailing support from parents. This year, the School was presented the Gold Award by the Social Welfare Department, for a total of 2669 hours of community service done by the boys and their parents. In February and in May, we were all saddened by the news of the snowstorm in China, then the cyclone attack in Burma and earthquake in Sichuan. With the generosity of parents and teachers and boys, we raised a total of \$220,000 in aid of disaster victims. It is our common wish that the victims may get the help they need in rebuilding their homes.

## **Development in Information Technology**

The integration of I.T. into daily teaching and the boys’ learning has always been a major concern in our school plan. To achieve this, we are committed to maintaining a high standard of equipment and facilities in the classrooms, the Multi-media Learning Centre and the Campus TV Studio. The intranet system, launched in September 2006, is becoming more and more popular. Not only does

the system enhance students' e-learning activities, it also brings home and school closer together. Parents now have access to notices previously or newly issued by entering the School's intranet system. They may also sign reply slips on-line. Over 90% of our parents opted for e-notices, and piles of paper are saved.

### **Staff Development**

In order to keep themselves abreast of the latest development in learning and teaching, subject knowledge, curriculum planning, information and technology, education policies, etc., teachers attended courses, seminars, workshops, briefing sessions and experience sharing sessions. Apart from engaging themselves in degree awarding courses individually, they participated in training sessions in small groups and as a whole school. The topics included

Teachers' professional development is not confined to structured learning alone. They also share good practices with colleagues in other schools when being invited. In February, soon after the joint schools teacher development activity, Mr. Hui Man Shui and Mrs. Lai Tam Chu Wan Sandy, Chinese Panel Chair and Vice Chair, were invited by King's College Old Boys' Association Primary School No. 2 to share their experience in the implementation process of our school based approach, which included a two-year pilot scheme started in 2004, in using Putonghua to teach Chinese.

In order to broaden our views on school improvement, we visited Victoria Shanghai Academy in May, to see their well designed new school and updated facilities.

## **Parent Teacher Association**

The St. Paul's College Primary School Parent Teacher Association was established in October 1995. Its aim is to promote close liaison between school and home as well as to foster friendly relations between parents and teachers, and among the parents themselves. 392 parents of 402 boys joined the Association in 2007 – 2008.

The thirteenth Annual General Meeting was held on 5th October 2007. At the meeting, eight parent members were elected to serve on the Executive Committee. They were Mrs. Chan Wong Ting Tiffany, Mrs. Chen Ong Fu Hui Alice, Mr. Chang Hang Cheong Stephen, Mrs. Fung Chow Suk Yi Canny, Mrs. Kwan Lee Chun Yu Belinda, Mr. Lai Chi Yiu Ranson, Mrs. Lam Lam Sau Shun Doris and Mrs. Tse Cheung Yee Man Elaine. Teacher members were Mrs. Yvonne Chan, Mr. Lau Wai Man, Mrs. Chan Li Yan Pui, Mr. Lee Born Ting Otto, Miss Lee Loi Yue, Mr. Leung Kwan Nam and Mrs. Yung Wong Siu Yin. Mr. Ranson Lai and Mr. Stephen Chang were elected Chairman and Vice-chairman respectively at the first standing committee meeting.

Under Mr. Ranson Lai's (parent of Lai Ho Yin Conan, JC 2B) leadership, all PTA working groups carried out their mission whole-heartedly. Mr. Stephen Chang (parent of Chang Conrad, JC 2C) looked after the Nanny Bus Concern Group, while Mrs. Canny Fung (parent of Fung Shek Fai Stone, JC 6C) coordinated parents who served on the lunch-time relief team. Mrs. Tiffany Chan (parent of Chan Tsz Yuk, JC 4C and Chan Chun Pui, JC 2A) and Mrs. Belinda Kwan (parent of Kwan Lok Him Alexander, JC 6C and Kwan Lok Zhun Christopher, JC 1C) coordinated two groups of story-tellers, including mums and dads, to care for the JC 1 and JC 2 boys, telling them stories at lunch-time the whole year round. Mrs. Alice Chen (parent of Chen Ki Fung Gavyn, JC 1B) was found a professional treasurer and Mrs. Doris Lam (parent of Lam Adrian Iain, JC 5C) an efficient and a proficient secretary. Although not serving in the Standing Committee this year, Ms. Karen Lau (parent of Lau Chun Shing Tristan, JC 4B) and Mrs. Stella Chan (parent of Chan Chak Hin, JC 4C) continued to assist our librarian in ordering books and wrapping them. A team of parents also came to the School regularly to assist in the library.

In January, soon after the examinations, Mr. Ranson Lai organised an English drama, Aladdin, presented by Chucky Onion, for boys, parents and teachers. The programme was so popular that it was far over-subscribed.

For the fourth time, the PTA held a Spell-a-thon in February to raise funds for the PTA Education Resource. To solicit contributions, the boys had to spell the words on a list supplied by the teachers, or recite a poem in Putonghua to their relatives or friends. This year, Mrs. Elaine Tse (parent of Tse Long Heng Ronnie, JC 1B) was in charge of this annual project, and a total of \$44,500 was raised, breaking the previous record.

As in previous years, parents were invited to take part in competitions at our swimming gala and

sports day. Over 100 parents volunteered to help as time-keepers, position judges and marshal assistants so that the exciting events could take place smoothly and efficiently.

On 12th May, 360 boys and parents took part in the PTA outing organised by Mrs. Alice Chen, Treasurer of the PTA. They all had a wonderful day in Sai Kung, hiking and sightseeing at Hoi Ha Wan and the West Dam of High Island Reservoir.

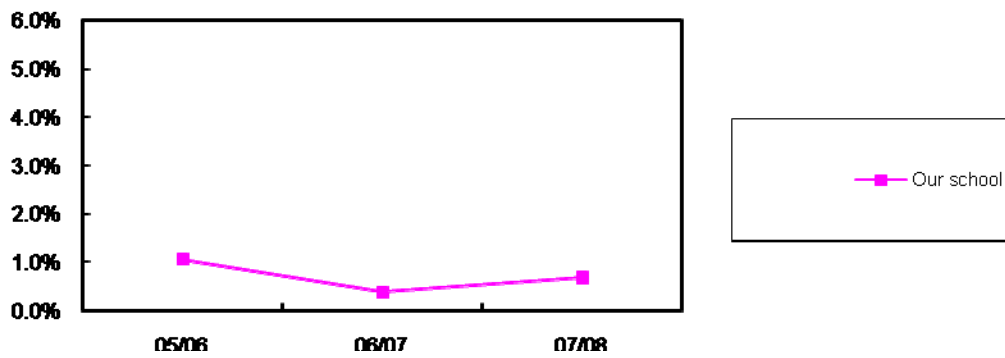

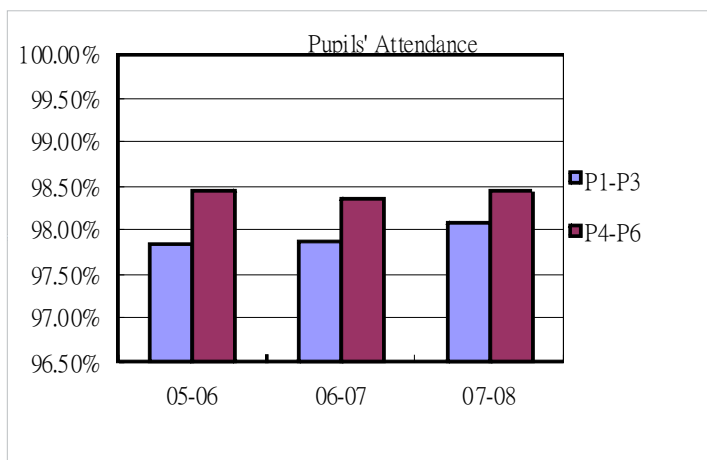

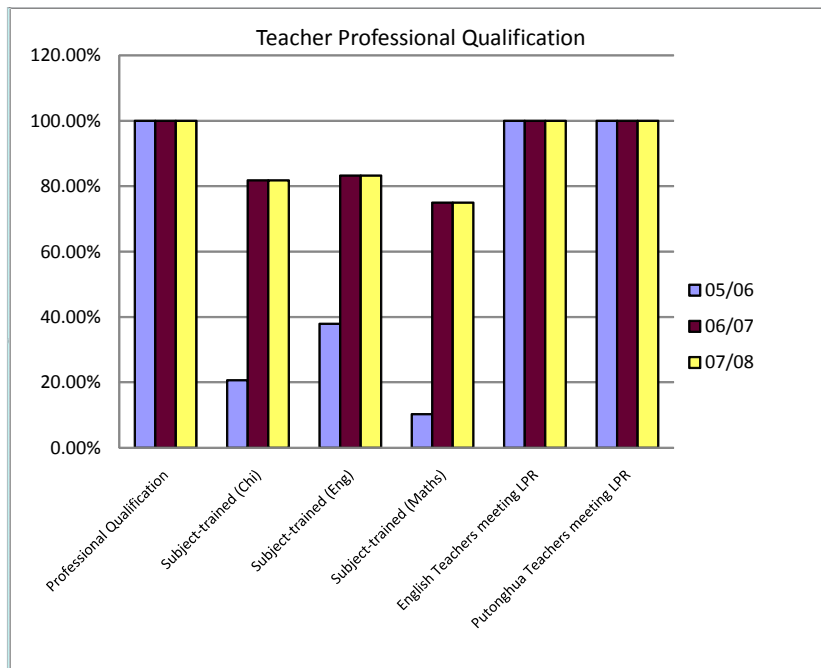
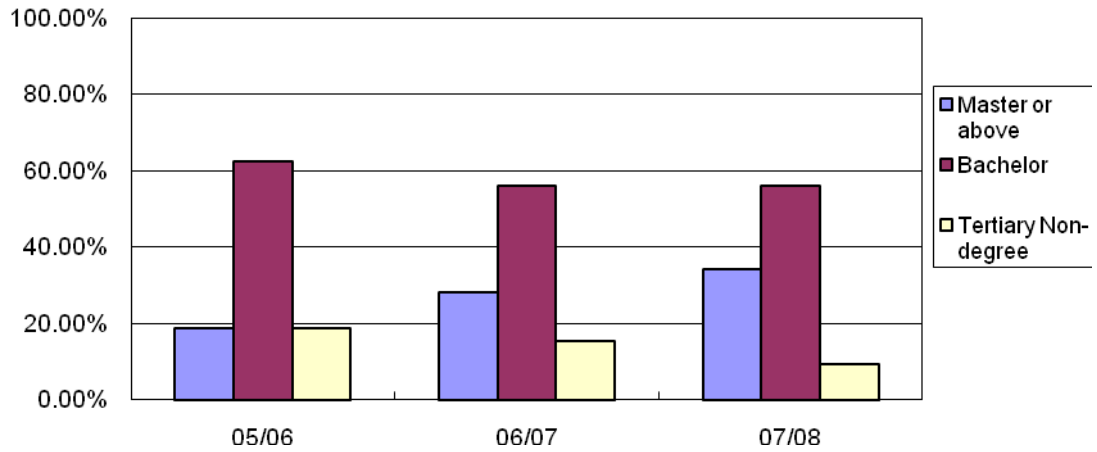
## Pupils' Attendance



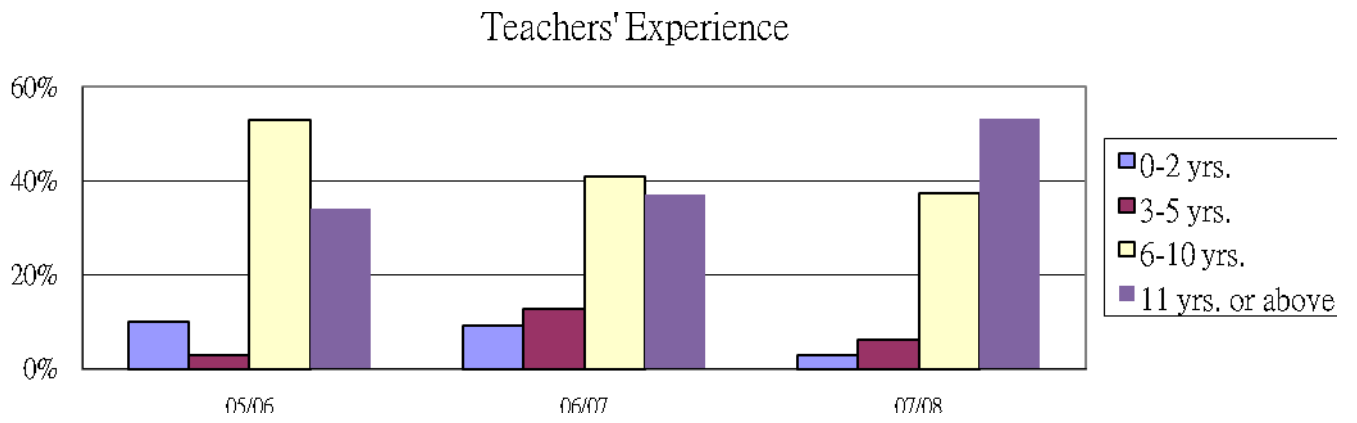
